VISA REQUIREMENTS	A valid passport is required for anyone who enters the Kingdom of Swaziland.
DRIVING LICENCE REQUIREMENTS	An International Driving Permit is compulsory for holders of driving licenses not incorporating a photograph and also recommended for photocard licence holders.
GENERAL RULE OF THE ROAD	Driving is on the left hand side of the road. Seat belts are mandatory for driver and front seat passenger. If official or royal motorcade approaches, you are required to pull over and stop. Speed limit is 80km/h on open roads and 60km/h in towns.
GENERAL ROAD CONDITIONS	Roads connecting to major towns, villages and cities are paved. Unpaved roads leading to villages are nicely gravelled to allow easy traffic movement. The National Road Network comprise approximately 1500 km of main roads and approximately 2268.64 km of district roads.
DOCUMENTATION FOR ENTRY OF FOREIGN REGISTERED VEHICLE	It is recommended to use a carnet. Vehicle other than one registered in South Africa, will have to complete Form 36 at Swazi border posts on entry and departure for customs purposes. A road fund levy, currently E 50, is payable at the border for all non-Swazi registered vehicles. Vehicles may be searched at the borders.
FUEL	Unleaded petrol available. There are plenty of petrol stations.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS	Malaria prevention measures for those visiting the lowland areas. Avoid swimming in still or slow-moving dams and rivers as bilharzia is also a risk. Visitors arriving in Swaziland within six days of having been in a yellow fever infected area require a vaccination certificate. Mains water in hotels and towns is safe to drink. Medical facilities are poor in the country, but the tourist hotels offer private services for minor problems. Serious cases can be transported to South Africa for treatment. Medical insurance is recommended.
